

FAIR INFORMATION

- 1. The 2024 Lane County Fair will open its gates to the public Wed. July 24, 2024 at 11:00 a.m. and will close its gates to the public on Sun. July 28, 2024 at 8:00 p.m.
- 2. The Lane County Fair will have security officers on the grounds and will use every reasonable precaution for the preservation of the property but will not be responsible for loss or damage by theft, fire, water damage or assume any liability for accidents to property. All matters of fire protection are under the direct supervision of the Eugene & Springfield Fire & EMS Department.
- 3. Exhibitors agree to allow the Lane County Fair to use their name and pictures in Fair related materials including photos of entries and the publishing of results. Contact the Exhibits Coordinator if you have a specific concern.

If you are unable to bring your entry on entry drop off day, please make arrangements to have someone bring it for you. We are unable to accept entries after the entry drop off date. The Fair Business Office will <u>not</u> accept any entries at any time.

All entries are to be picked up July 29, 11:00am-6:00pm. Any entries left after 6:00pm will be forfeited. Exhibit shall <u>not</u> be released until the time and date specified. All exhibits are to be picked up at the building where entry was received and you must present the claim check (if given one). Any exhibitor who removes

their exhibit before the release date and time without permission will forfeit all awards including premiums and will not be allowed to exhibit in the next year's Lane County Fair. Forms are available at the Fair Business Office if you need to make arrangements for someone else to pick-up your entry and awards. Cash premiums must be picked up by July 30 at 4p.m. – More information on Page 4.

EXHIBITS POLICIES

Guidelines for each department can be found in that department's information section of this book. The Lane County Fair Board reserves the final and absolute right to amend, add to, delete, and interpret these rules and regulations and arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard thereto, or otherwise arising out of, or connected with the Fair. In all cases, the decision of Fair Management shall be final and binding.

ENTRY POLICIES

- 1. THERE ARE NO ENTRY FEES FOR STILLS EXHIBITS.
- 2. Exhibitor entry age is as of September 1, 2023.
- 3. Entry limits for Open Show are listed in each department. In the Open Show only one placing will be awarded per exhibitor per class unless noted otherwise. Display may be limited at the discretion of the Fair.
- 4. Entries in all departments are limited to residents living or owning land in Lane County, Oregon unless approved by Fair Management. Fair Management reserves the right to reject or accept any exhibit offered, to limit entries according to space available and to eliminate or combine classes if insufficient entries are received.
- 5. Entries must be the handiwork of the exhibitor in the class in which it is being judged.
- 6. All entries must have been completed within the last two (2) years and cannot be shown at the Lane County Fair more than once.
- 7. Entries may be reclassified and/or disqualified by the Coordinator and/or Judges if they do not meet conditions of entry or are incorrectly entered.
- 8. The Lane County Fair reserves the right to refuse inappropriate work and/or subject matter for general exhibition and its audience. The discretion of the Lane County Fair concerning the appropriateness of work and its presentation is final. The Lane County Fair reserves the right to refuse exhibits which violate community standards of decency or which infringe upon the rights of, or cause bodily harm or intimidation to our staff, exhibitors or members of the public, and to refuse entry when deemed unsuitable by Fair Management. This may include but is not limited to nudity, violence, and inappropriate language.
- 9. Only products entered in the Fair may be displayed during the Fair.

JUDGING POLICIES

- 1. All entries will be judged on the American System (Rank System) meaning entries will be marked 1st, 2nd, 3rd or Honorable Mention. All Open Show entries are eligible to receive premiums, ribbons, donor awards and special awards which may include cash awards paid out during premium payouts.
- 2. If a department has three or fewer entries, judging placements are up to the judge's discretion and may not be awarded premiums.
- 3. Any names of exhibitors on entries must be covered for the judging process.
- 4. Department Coordinators, under the direction of Fair Management, shall have full charge of their department, and exhibitors must follow their order relating to placing of exhibits, showing, etc.
- 5. It is the duty of the Department Coordinator to make such correction as they deem necessary if it is ascertained that an entry is entered in a division or class in which it does not properly belong or fails to follow published rules/guidelines.
- 6. The Department Coordinators shall see that awards are correctly entered on the judging materials, checking all numbers and having each judge and clerk sign off on the results, and attaching their signature of approval and returning results to the Exhibits Coordinator.
- 7. Clerks are requested to make a note of all cases where registration or entry blanks are not satisfactory to the Coordinator and to indicate this on the transfer sheets prior to judging. Clerks shall not permit any person to examine their records while judging is in progress, except the Department Coordinator in charge or Fair Management. No person will be allowed to see the judging materials after the awards have been made and entered therein.

CONDUCT POLICIES

- 1. It is expected that ALL EXHIBITORS at the Fair conduct themselves with honesty, good sportsmanship and in a professional manner. Their conduct in the competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity.
- 2. The Lane County Fair reserves the right to stop, remove or relocate any exhibitor, their representative and/or exhibit performing any act or practice which, in the opinion of the Lane County Fair, is illegal; interferes with the performance of other exhibitors; creates a health, safety, or fire hazard; or violates any rules stated herein.
- 3. Exhibitors and any responsible person(s) found in violation of Fair rules or in practices unethical or inimical with the show program or violation of the above stated will forfeit awards, may face immediate expulsion from the Fair and shall be prohibited from future participation in the Lane County Fair for a minimum of 1 year.
- 4. Violations will be determined by Fair Management and/or brought to the Ethics Committee for review. The determination of Fair Management and/or the Ethics Committee will be considered final unless a formal protest is made in writing. Protests: All protests regarding judging, rules violations, and any other exhibits complaints or appeals must be submitted in writing (protest form is available in the Fair Business Office and online) to the Fair Business Office and be accompanied by a deposit of \$50.00 in cash, which will be forfeited if protest is not sustained. Such protest must state plainly the cause of complaint or appeal and must be filed with the Fair Business Office within 24 hours of the basis for the complaint or appeal. No complaint or appeal based upon the statement that the judge, judges, or management are incompetent will be considered.

AWARDS & PREMIUMS (CASH AWARDS)

- 1. Payment of premiums (cash awards) is contingent upon the availability of funds for distribution at the 2024 Lane County Fair.
- 2. All Open Show entries are eligible to receive premiums ribbons, donor awards and special awards.
- 3. Special contests have unique awards that do not follow the rest of the department premiums schedule. Information on special contest awards are found in the contest listing.
- 4. Individual exhibitors will be paid premiums in cash only during the designated premium pickup times. Organizations will be paid premiums in cash only. Any premiums not claimed by 4:00pm July 30, 2024, will be forfeited.
- 5. An error in the record of premiums awarded caused by oversight or neglect on the part of the Fair staff shall be subject to correction by the Fair Management. Errors must be brought to the attention of Fair Management before the cash premium pickup deadline (July 30, 2024). If an error is found to be valid in which an exhibitor has been overpaid, they are required to return the overpayment at the request of the Fair
- 6. Premiums will be paid out July 29 at the Convention Center from 11:00am-6:00pm or in the Fair Business Office on July 30 from 9:00am-4:00p.m. Time schedule and locations will be posted online, at entry days, and at the Fair. Any premiums not claimed by 4:00pm July 30, 2024 will be forfeited.
- 7. Exhibitors receiving \$600.00 or more in total premiums are required to complete a W-9 form at the time you pick up your premiums or prior to release of a check.
- 8. Cash Donor Awards will be paid by the Fair Business Office under the same guidelines as premiums are paid. The Fair Board is not responsible for awards from donors, although all reasonable care will be taken to ensure that winners receive such awards. Non-cash donor awards, ribbons and rosettes will be available no later than the time of release of the exhibit. Ribbons and rosettes not claimed at that time of release will be forfeited.
- 9. Any entry without merit shall not be awarded a placing merely because there is no competition. The judge/s shall award placing according to merit; and without merit, the judge/s shall make no award. No premium money will be paid on any article not listed in the department information.
- 10. Judges will be selected and contracted by the Lane County Fair. The decision of the judges (as submitted to the Fair Business Office) are final and no appeal will be considered except in case of protest to Fair Management. Ribbons and entry tags will have no value as to payment of premiums or awards. Any person interfering with the judges during their adjudication will forfeit the right to premiums and placements. Judges will not be allowed to adjudicate in a class in which they are exhibitors. All officers are required and exhibitors are requested to report any violation of this rule to the Exhibits Coordinator.

SPECIAL AWARDS

- 1. Donor awards are awarded by donor requested parameters.
- 2. Multi-departmental winners are eligible to win the same award every three years. The winner of 2021 shall be allowed to win in 2024.
- 3. Winners can only win 1 multi-departmental award per year whether multi-department or single department. If an exhibitor has the most points in more than one category, they will be awarded the award with the highest prize value and any other award/s will go to the runner-up/s.
- 4. Multi-Department Awards Exhibitor must have entered at least one entry in all of the departments that the award is for. If no exhibitor is eligible, exhibitors who have entered all but one may be considered.



Tips for Entering Land Products

- Trueness to type: Should be typical of the variety in shape, color, and size.
- Quality & condition: Should be edible, in prime condition, without blemishes or damage from insects, disease, or handling. Deepest color is preferred.
- Uniformity: Should be alike in shape, size, color, texture and stage of maturity.
- Bring one dozen unless otherwise listed.
- Do not bring immature entries.
- Wooden Flats and paper plates will be furnished for individual entries. Full flats are 12"X18". Half flats are 12"X9". Paper plates are various sizes.

- All agricultural organizations having a credible display that has been pre-registered (by June 14th)
 will receive \$200.00 and a certificate.
- The space provided for display booths will be approximately 10' wide, 8' deep, with an 8' high back and a sloping display area of 24 to 43 inches.

The People's Choice award is given to 1 display (2 runners up also determined). Space provided for display will be 32"X30". Ribbons will be awarded for 1st, 2nd, 3rd place. The Fair Board will award \$25.00 to each display that pre-registers by June 13th, meets specifications and maintains such. All food items must be wrapped to avoid insects. The Agricultural Focus Display for the Lane County Fair will be an educational representation of an agricultural topic. Each Agricultural Focus Display is to include your grange name and number. You may use pictures, props or products to present your agricultural topic. REMEMBER: An educational display stimulates thought, teaches facts or shows a process. Judging criteria for your display will be based on the overall presentation.

All threshed grain, grasses and legumes must be exhibited in one-quart clear glass jars only. Grain and grass sheaves should be bright clear straw, tightly tied not less than 3" in diameter. All other exhibits MUST be 4" or more at butts & tightly tied. Tie all sheaves with string. In selecting grain and grass materials for exhibits, the material should be gathered just as the exhibit matures, selecting even heads in length and size. Keep in a cool place until prepared for exhibit. Grains should be stripped when the material is just past full bloom or while the leaves are dark in color.

Cut Flowers: Exhibitor must have grown all entries. Entries should be shown with their own attached leaves. The Fair will furnish containers. Exhibitors are asked to replace as often as necessary for the duration of the Fair, at least once. Coordinate exchange with the Department Coordinator. Write the plant botanic (common) name on the entry card.

Potted Plants: Must have been grown by, or in the possession of, the exhibitor 60 days prior to the Fair and must have a water saucer. Up to gallon size plastic or pottery containers and/or baskets. No hanging baskets or huge tubs. Write plant botanic (common) name on the card.

Design Divisions: Exhibitors must furnish their own containers labeled on the bottom with the owner's name. Arranger may place own arrangement. Staff will assist. Arrangements must be kept fresh until the close of Fair. Please plan on replacing flower arrangements at least once. Arrangements not conforming to schedule will be used for display only. Foliage is permitted in all classes unless otherwise specified. Accessories are permitted. Absolutely no sand anywhere in the Floral Department. Artificial flowers and/or foliage are excluded from entry. Designs may use up to 30"X30" except miniatures. Only one design entry per class allowed in Open Show Design Divisions (unlimited entries in Youth Fair divisions). The exhibitor must make designs and need not have grown plant material. Be sure your design won't leak water on the table.

Table Setting Divisions: Must provide your own table not to exceed 36". No silverware. Tray tables will be staged on 8' tables with maximum room for staging of 24"X24". Exhibitor must make designs and has choice of all materials used and need not have grown them.

 canning methods and jam & jelly jar inversions for sealing are not currently accepted. Judges may or
 may not open any or all exhibits. It is up to the judge to choose if they will taste an exhibit.
- Process according to current standards making sure to adjust for elevation etc. Up to date guidelines
 can be found here: http://extension.oregonstate.edu/fch/food-preservation or
 http://nchfp.uga.edu/publications/publications usda.html
- A process label is required for all food entries, including soft spreads and dried foods. Canning labels
 may be picked up at the Fair Business Office prior to entry day or completed on entry day. For classes
 requiring recipes rubber band the recipe around the jar firmly.



ART - PROPER FRAMING & PRESENTATION NOTES

FRAMING: All fine art must be framed or matted with wire or other appropriate method to assure sturdy hanging throughout the duration of the Fair. No masking/duct/or other tape or string/ribbon please. **Proper framing will be considered by the judges**. We use peg board hooks to hang art so please do not use your own hooks.

ENTRY WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED IF NOT FRAMED PROPERLY! If art is not ready to hang, we will request you re-enter it.

All framing hardware needs to be tightly secured. Wire needs to be secured tightly to hangers. Appropriate hanging wires should be used according to the weight of the artwork. No saw-toothed hangers.



Frames: Properly assembled metal or wood frames. Check for scratches, dirt, paint, fingerprints on glass or Plexiglass.



Who can enter exhibits to the Lane County Fair?

Anyone who lives in Lane County.

What is the cost to enter exhibits into the Lane County Fair?

• There are no entry fees for creative exhibits.

Why should I enter exhibits into the Lane County Fair?

• Entering exhibits into the Lane County Fair is a fun and easy way to showcase your skills and display your creations for all to see during the Fair. You can also win ribbons, rosettes, premiums (cash awards), donor awards and other prizes!

How do I enter my exhibits into the Lane County Fair?

- Beginning in April the Fair Book will become available and exhibitors can view the divisions and classes offered as well as all of the contests.
- Beginning in May you can submit your entries online or you can submit a paper entry form and drop it
 off at the Fair Business Office. *Online entries preferred when possible.
- July 5 is the deadline for all online entries. Paper entries are accepted at the Fair Business Office until Friday, July 5, 2024. Exhibitors may also enter on-site during the department's drop off period.
- Drop off your exhibits during the department's drop-off period. The drop off schedule is posted online and in the Fair Book.
- Visit the Lane County Fair to see your exhibits displayed in each department. Exhibits are displayed all five days of the Fair. Admission to the Fair is not included with creative entries.
- Monday following the Fair all entries will be released for pick-up from 11am-6pm. Exhibitors who won
 ribbons and donor awards will pick these items up during entry pick-up. Exhibitors will pick up their
 entries from the same location where they dropped them off.
- Monday and Tuesday following the Fair exhibitors can claim any cash premiums that they won.
 Premium payouts are only distributed during these two days. Any premiums not picked-up by 4pm on July 25 will be forfeited. Times and locations can be found in the Fair Book.

What is the difference between Open Show and Youth Fair?

Open Show is for adults 18 and over and the Youth Fair is for exhibitors under the age of 18. Exhibitor
entry age is as of September 1 the year prior.

What is a division and a class?

A division is a category within a department. A class is a specific category within a division. For
example, the Baking & Candy department has a division for pies. Within the division you can select the
class you would like such as apple, custard, lemon meringue.

What is a premium?

Premiums are cash awards that exhibitors may win when they receive a 1st, 2nd, or 3rd place ribbon or a special award. Special contests have unique awards that do not follow the rest of the department premiums schedule. Payment of premiums is contingent upon the availability of funds for distribution at the 2024 Lane County Fair.

Can I enter in all departments?

• Yes, exhibitors can enter in all seven departments and will be eligible to win the Grand Champion of the Fair.

Is there a limit to how much I can enter or win?

• Each department has their own entry limits listed in the Fair Book. There is no limit on the amount of prizes or cash premiums that exhibitors can win.

Who monitors my entry during the Fair?

Department Coordinators and staff monitor the creative exhibits during the Fair. The Lane County Fair
will have security officers on the grounds and will use every reasonable precaution for the preservation
of the property but will not be responsible for loss or damage by theft, fire, water damage or assume
any liability for accidents to property.

What should I do if I cannot pick-up my entry on the Monday or Tuesday after the Fair?

• Forms are available at the Fair Business Office if you need to make arrangements for someone else to pick-up your entry and awards.

Who judges my entry?

Judges are selected by Department Coordinators and the judges are experts in the area that they are
judging. The decision of the judges (as submitted to the Fair Business Office) are final and no appeal
will be considered except in case of protest to Fair Management.

Will photos of my entry be used for Fair marketing materials?

• Exhibitors agree to allow the Lane County Fair to use their name and pictures in Fair related materials including photos of entries and the publishing of results. Contact the Exhibits Coordinator if you have a specific concern.
